Admissions Consultation on proposed changes to Lionheart Educational Trust Broom Leys Primary School

Admission Arrangements for the 2026-2027 school year. Period of Consultation: Monday 4th November 2024 to Friday 20th December 2024

As part of Lionheart Educational Trust, from Monday 4th November until Friday 20th December 2024 Broom Leys Primary School will be consulting on proposed changes to their 2026-2027 admission arrangements. All schools/academies/colleges must have admission arrangements that clearly set out how children will be admitted, including information about what happens if there are more applications than places available (oversubscription criteria). The criteria must be reasonable, clear, objective, and procedurally fair and comply with all relevant legislation, including equalities legislation. It is for the admissions authority (Lionheart Educational Trust) to decide which criteria are most suitable for the school/academy according to local circumstances.

The Proposed Changes:

Broom Leys Primary School are consulting on changing their oversubscription criteria, outlined in appendix 1, and inline with the code of admissions.

All material changes are outlined in appendix 1.

Other changes to detail and wording have been made throughout the Policy, however these do not affect the admission process or the rights of those applying to the school.

Who are we consulting with?

The School Admissions Code 2021 requires that all admission authorities undertake a statutory consultation to seek the views and comments of parents/carers, other admission authorities, schools in the relevant area, Leicester City and County Council including neighbouring local authorities and anyone else who may be affected by the proposed changes. The consultation will run for 6 weeks commencing on Monday 4th November and closing on Friday 20th December 2024 at 4pm. A copy of the School Admissions Code 2021 can be found at:
